Hālau 'o Kapikohānaiāmālama 2018 is open to students entering grades 3-12, including current Kamehameha Schools students, and students attending the State of Hawai'i DOE, public charter schools and other private institutions. Elementary and middle school programs are full-day experiences. High school students can elect morning, afternoon, or full-day courses. Class sizes are limited to ensure optimal teacher-to-student ratios.

The Hālau 'o Kapikohānaiāmālama program offers credit advancement for high school students seeking to earn required and/or elective credit(s). Our early college courses allow high school students the opportunity to earn both college and high school credits simultaneously.

Students should obtain pre-approval for course credits from their home schools before registering in KS summer classes to ensure acceptance of credit(s) earned. Kamehameha Schools Maui students can request principal approval for credit courses by submitting the Request of Credit Approval form to the Kula Ki'eki'e office. #### Hālau 'o Kapikohānaiāmālama Program Overview

Kamehameha Schools Maui is excited to present Hālau 'o Kapikohānaiāmālama Summer 2018. Translated as the life source that feeds and nourishes, Hālau 'o Kapikohānaiāmālama focuses on empowering and nurturing learners through rigorous and relevant experiences that are 'āina based, 'Ōiwi STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art and math) focused and culturally connected. These experiences allow learners to grow and expand skills they will need as lāhui contributors in the 21st century.

Hālau 'o Kapikohānaiāmālama is a four week learning experience where students are engaged in exciting, hands-on design thinking and relevant project based learning. Haumana will visit 'āina based sites, learn from community experts and deepen their knowledge of our island home. This program offers unique and worthwhile educational opportunities that cultivate a student's desire to learn and be prepared for success in the new school year.

#### Mission

Kamehameha Schools' mission is to fulfill Pauahi's desire to create educational opportunities in perpetuity to improve the capability and well-being of people of Hawaiian ancestry.





#### **Application Process**

Early registration is recommended as course seats fill quickly. Enrollment is based on the date your child's application is received and upon grade level course availability. Program notification letters will be mailed out in early April. Waitlisted students are considered for enrollment through the end of May.

Kamehameha Schools reserves the right to cancel any class should enrollment fall below the minimum required.

## Policy to Give Preference to Hawaiian Applicants

Kamehameha Schools' policy is to give preference to applicants of Hawaiian ancestry to the extent permitted by law. If you would like to be considered under that policy, your Hawaiian ancestry must be verified by Kamehameha's Ho'oulu Hawaiian Data Center (Data Center).

Please work directly with the Data Center staff to complete your ancestry determination as soon as possible and preferably no later than the application deadline for the program for which you are applying. #### **Financial Aid**

Students who are awarded financial aid and later decide not to attend summer programs must notify the Hālau 'o Kapikohānaiāmālama office at 573-7037 immediately to allow waitlisted students the opportunity to enroll. Parents failing to provide timely notice, prior to the start of summer program, will be given a lower priority when registering for future programs.

#### **Students with Disabilities**

Bus seat awards will accompany conditional enrollment letters mailed to applicants in early April. Bus transportation for waitlisted students who are later offered a program seat is not guaranteed and may not be available on desired routes.

Bus seating capacity is limited, and route pick up and drop off times are approximate. No route changes, alterations, or courtesy stops are allowed. The Transportation Department reserves the right to cancel or change bus route times and locations dependent upon rider enrollment.

Parents are responsible for retrieving students in a timely manner after daily close of program. Campus supervision is not available for High School students who choose a half-day schedule. Parents are responsible for dropping off students in time for class and picking up students in a timely manner after their last class of the day.

High school students enrolled in full-day and morning or afternoon only courses are eligible for roundtrip bus transportation. A special midday departure and returning bus will be available between War Memorial Stadium and the Kamehameha Schools Maui campus for high school students. Please refer to the transportation section for details of available service. No campus supervision is available for students who choose a half day schedule beyond course instruction.

Students driving to and from campus must complete the <u>Student Parking Pass Application Form</u> and submit all required documents to obtain a pass. All parking applications are kept on file with Hālau 'o Kapikohānaiāmālama (non-KS students) or the High School Office (KS students). KS students with a 2017-18 approved driving pass may use the same pass during the summer and do not need to reapply.

#### **Attendance Policy**

#### **Absences**

Hālau 'o Kapikohānaiāmālama, KSM Summer School has a strict attendance policy. Daily attendance is critical for students to truly benefit from a rigorous and dynamic summer learning experience and master course materials. Absences due to family trips and vacations, games and/or athletic tournaments are discouraged and students who are unable to commit to the full duration of their registered program should not apply.

'A' ole 'ulu e loa' a i ka pōkole o ka lou. Breadfruit cannot be reached when the picking stick is too short. (There is little chance for success without proper preparation.)

Students should be in school every day to prepare themselves for the opportunities and challenges presented. Research shows that few factors within students' and families' control are more closely associated with academic success than school attendance. Students need to be present in school to benefit from the teachers instruction, and from interaction and exchange of ideas with peers. Excessive absences affect the culture of the classroom, where the goal of faculty is to build a vibrant community of learners.

#### **Elementary and Middle School**

Absences will affect student progress. Consequences for students with (3) or more unexcused absences during the 2018 Summer Program will result in your application being given a lower priority during registration for the following summer. This may result in your child's inability to register for any 2019 summer courses. Excessive absences will also lead to disciplinary action which may include a *No Pass* for the course.

#### **High School**

Students enrolled in a credited course shall lose credit status if more than one (1) day is missed. Two or more absences will result in release from the Summer Program with no refund.

#### **Student Evaluations**

**Elementary and Middle School:** Students in grades 6-8 will receive a final student progress report with *Pass* or *No Pass* as an evaluation of their work.

**High School:** Students in grades 9 through 12 will receive a final report card with letter grades A-F for credit courses and Pass or No Pass for non-credit courses as an evaluation of their work. A copy of the student's credit level grades can be sent to the school that the student will attend in Fall 2018, as designated.

#### **Lunch and Special Diets**

Nutritious lunches prepared in the Dining Hall and snacks are included in the full-day tuition cost. All full-day students are required to eat school lunches.

Students with special dietary needs must bring a physician's note stating dietary restrictions prior to start date of summer program. Requests will be reviewed on a case by case basis.

The Hālau 'o Kapikohānaiāmālama program offers credit advancement for high school students seeking to earn required and/or elective credit(s). Early college courses allow high school students the opportunity to earn both college and high school credits simultaneously. Please see our Early College Program section for more information.

Students should obtain pre-approval for course credits from their home schools before registering in KS summer classes to ensure acceptance of credit(s) earned. Kamehameha Schools Maui students can request principal approval for credit courses by submitting the Request of Credit Approval form to the Kula Ki'eki'e office. #### Course Descriptions: Grades 9-12 (High School)

#### MATHEMATICS LAB

Course Number: MS04001 Morning Session: 8:00am – 11:15am

- Open to grade 9-10 students
- .5 elective credit for KSM students

This course is designed for students seeking to strenghten their mathematical skills and understanding of math concepts. Students will be given the time and support to focus on the following math strands: Numbers and Operations; Measurement; Geometry and Spatial Sense; Patterns; Functions and Algebra; as well as Data Analysis, Statistics, and Probability. Integrated field experiences will provide students will culturally relevant, real world application of mathematics as it applies to history, science, engineering and Hawaiian cultural practices in local or global contexts.

#### ETHNO-ALGEBRA 1

Course Number: MS04002 Full Day Session: 8:00am – 3:00pm

- Open to grade 9-10 students
- 1 core credit for KSM students

Students will cover all of the major math concepts of Algebra 1 in a hands-on, real world application of mathematics around us. Integrated field experiences provide exciting intersections of math with Hawaiian culture, history, science and engineering in the local and global contexts. The math concepts covered in Algebra 1 include: The Real Number System; Solving, Graphing and Writing Linear Equations, Graphing Linear Inequalities, Solving Systems of Equations and Inequalities, Exponential Growth and Decay, Polynomials and the Introduction of the Quadratic Equation. Students will be expected to demonstrate understanding of the math concepts through real-world application.

#### SAT PREPARATION

Course Number: MS04003-1 Morning Session 8:00am – 11:15am Course Number: MS04003-2 Afternoon Session 11:45am-3:00pm

• Non-credit course open to all high school students

This course is designed to assist students in preparation for the SAT test. Students will learn test taking strategies and target skills that need building to improve their performance on the SAT.

#### INTRODUCTION TO SPORTS FUNDAMENTALS

Course Number: MS04011 Afternoon Session 11:45am-3:00pm

• Non-credit course open to all high school students

This course is designed to introduce students to the fundametal skills and strategy utilized in a select group of sports. Students will develop an understanding of sports like; wrestling, cross-country, football and Makahiki games. This course is also designed to instill principles of teamwork, conditioning and coordination development.

#### HO'OKELE WA'A 1

Course Number: MS04004 Full Day Session 8:00am – 1:15pm

Open to 11-12 grade students

KSM students: .5 elective credit

Wayfinding is an ancient art and science that our ancestors used to travel across vast oceans. This practice was restored in the 1970's with the help of master navigator Mau Piailug and through the creation of the voyaging wa'a Hokule'a. Now after 40 years of sailing, Hōkūle'a and a new generation of wayfinders have accomplished what some have thought impossible... A sail around the world! If you are inclined to join in this 2,000 year long mo'okū'auhau of voyagers, join us and Hui o Wa'a Kaulua and come learn to sail Mo'okiha o Pi'ilani, Maui's double-hull voyaging wa'a. Students will be expected to swim frequently. A water skills training session and test will be administered in this course before the students go on the ocean. There will be 2 scheduled coastal sails that may occur outside of normal class time in which the students are expected to attend in order to earn credit for the course.



#### Early College Program

The Early College Program offers a curriculum of intensive study for strongly motivated and academically qualified sophomores, juniors and seniors. This unique partnership between Kamehameha Schools Maui and the University of Hawai'i-Maui College (UHMC) allows high school sophomores, juniors and seniors to attend college classes either on the Kamehameha Schools Maui or UHMC campuses. The Early College Program offers college courses that allow high school students the opportunity to earn both college and high school credits simultaneously. Students should obtain preapproval for course credits from their home schools before registering in KS summer classes to ensure acceptance of credit(s) earned. You will not be considered for enrollment into courses within this program unless you complete all steps in the early admissions process and submit all necessary documentation.

UHMC instructions and forms pertinent to the Early College Admit process will be available to you and required to complete registration and consideration for Early College courses.

To qualify for this program, students must complete the Early College Admit process which includes;

- UHMC Online Admissions Application
- Health Clearance Form
- Consent to Release Grades for Early Admit Student to High School form
- Early Admission Program Application
- Completion of the Accuplacer exam with qualifying results eligible for prerequisites of specific courses.

Scores for the UH Maui Accuplacer exam are valid for one year from when the test is completed. Students should contact UH Maui College directly to make arrangements to take the compass test. UHMC charges a fee when a student takes the Accuplacer test. The first test is at no charge and any additional tests taken are the responsibility of each applicant.

Once you have completed the Early College Admit process, your application will be sent to UHMC to be reviewed. Upon approval, you will be sent an acceptance email and be responsible for creating a username and completing online registration into your UHMC selected course.

For courses that are held at UHMC, Hālau 'o Kapikohānaiāmalama will provide an on-site adult monitor who will be present during course instruction. No campus supervision will be provided beyond course instruction and parents are responsible for retrieving

students in a timely manner. Students will also be responsible for transportation to and from courses held at UHMC.

These courses are rigorous and expectations for students are high. Students are also subject to all college expectations and requirements as all courses are taught by UH Maui College professors. It is important to note that once enrolled in an early college course, a student may not withdraw or drop an early college credit course. Grades earned through these courses will be reflected on the student's college transcript.

Early college courses offered this summer include: AMT 20 Introduction to Auto Mechanics, ENG 100 Composition I, CULN 111 Introduction to Culinary Arts, ICS 101 Digital Tools for the Information World, ICS 110 Introduction to Computer Programming, & SOC 100 General Survey of Sociology. These all qualify for dual credit for KSM students. This means that the course will count as a college and high school credit. All other students must check with their home schools if dual credit will be applicable.



## Early College Credit: INTRODUCTION TO AUTO MECHANICS (AUTOMOTIVE TECHNOLOGY 20)

Course Number: MS04005 Morning Session 8:00am-11:15am

Prerequisite: Student must maintain a valid Driver's license throughout duration of the automotive course of studies, or consent. Recommended: Placement at ENG 21 or higher.

- Open to 10-12 grade students
- All students who complete course will earn 2 college credits
- All KSM students who complete course will earn .5 elective credit

Introduces principles for the operation of automotive systems. Explains the selection and use of basic automotive tools, equipment, and procedures for the preventative maintenances and minor repair service. Includes lectures, demonstrations, and lab work on shop training units and "live" service vehicles.

This course will be held at the University of Hawai'i Maui College campus.

Early College Credit: SANITATION AND SAFETY (CULINARY ARTS 112)

Course Number: MS04006 Morning Session 8:00am-11:15am

Prerequisite: ENG 19 with grade C or better or placement at least ENG 22, and MATH 75 with grade C or better or placement at least MATH 82, or consent.

- Open to 10-12 grade students
- All students who complete course will earn 2 college credits
- All KSM students who complete course will earn .5 elective credit

Studies and applies the principles and procedures of sanitation and safety in the hospitality industry. Includes the study of food-borne illnesses, biological, chemical, physical hazards, and cross-contamination as they may occur during the flow of food. Introduces HACCP (Hazard Analysis Critical Control Point) and other sanitation and safety programs. Covers safety issues and OSHA (Occupational Safety and Health Administration) guidelines and standards as they apply to the hospitality industry.

This course will be held at the University of Hawai'i Maui College campus.

Early College Credit: COMPOSITION I (ENGLISH 100)

Course Number: MS04007 Morning Session 8:00am-11:15am

Prerequisite: ENG 22 with grade C or better, or placement at ENG 100, or consent.

- Open to 10-12 grade students
- All students who complete course will earn 3 college credits
- All KSM students who complete course will earn 1 elective credit

Discovers and applies the concepts of purpose, audience, and tone in writing. Emphasizes evaluating written texts and writing various types of essays, including writing from sources. Focuses on critical thinking.

This course will be held at the Kamehameha Schools Maui campus.

Early College Credit: DIGITAL TOOLS FOR THE

#### INFORMATION WORLD

(INFORMATION COMPUTER SCIENCE 101)

Course Number: MS04008 Morning Session 8:00am-11:15am

- Open to 10-12 grade students
- All students who complete course will earn 3 college credits
- All KSM students who complete course will earn .5 elective credit

Emphasizes production of professional level documents, spreadsheets, presentations, databases, and web pages for problem solving. Includes concepts, terminology, and a contemporary operating system.

This course will be held at the Kamehameha Schools Maui campus.

Early College Credit: INTRO TO COMPUTER

#### **PROGRAMMING**

(INFORMATION COMPUTER SCIENCE 110)

Course Number: MS04009 Morning Session 8:00am-11:15am

Prerequisite: ICS 101 or BUSN 150, either with grade C or better, or consent.

- Open to 10-12 grade students
- All students who complete course will earn 3 college credits
- All KSM students who complete course will earn .5 elective credit

Teaches fundamental programming concepts including sequential, selection, and repetition flow; variables and types; syntax; error types; compilation; linking; loading; and debugging. Introduces algorithms, flow charts, UML, and other analytic tools. Explains and practices problem solving and critical thinking methods.

This course will be held at the Kamehameha Schools Maui campus.

Early College Credit: SURVEY OF GENERAL SOCIOLOGY (SOCIOLOGY 100)

Course Number: MS04010 Morning Session 8:00am-11:15am

- Open to 10-12 grade students
- All students who complete course will earn 3 college credits
- All KSM students who complete course will earn 1 elective credit

Introduces study of basic social relationships. Treats socialization, concept of culture, social stratification, prejudice, cultural change, and trends in modern society.

This course will be held at the Kamehameha Schools Maui campus.
