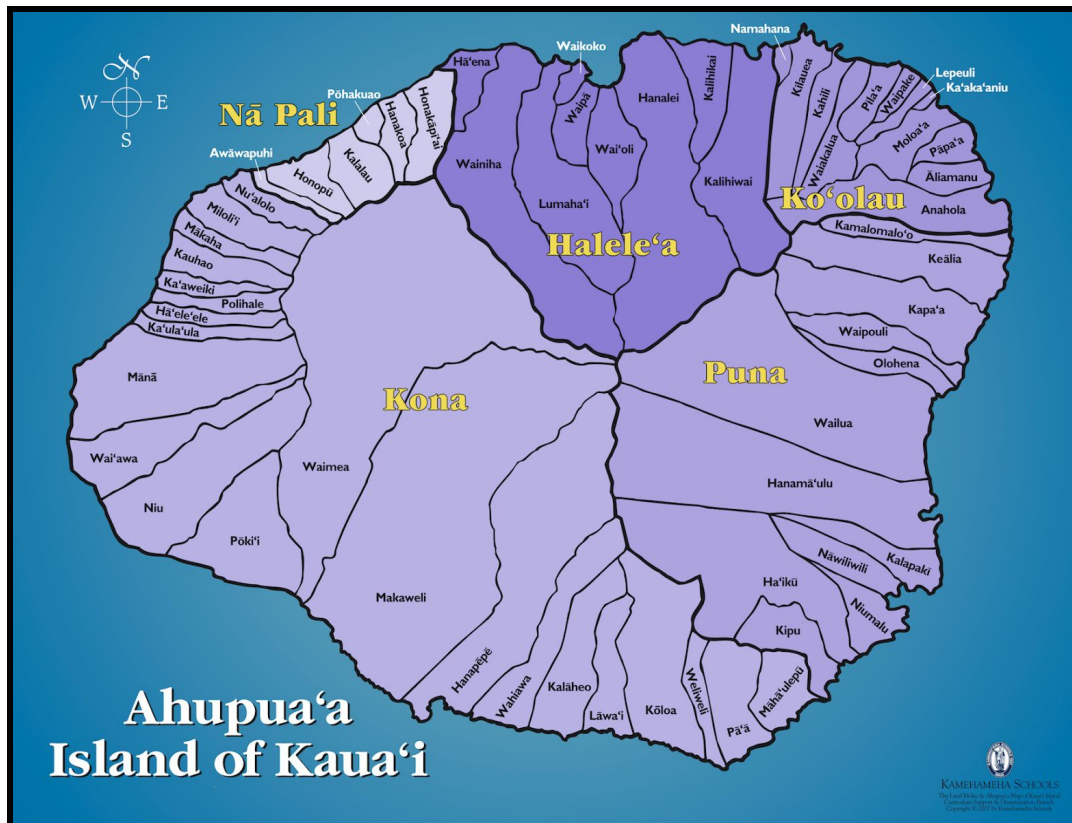

Kilohana

The goals of Kilohana are to support the development of a sense of place and belonging, Native Hawaiian identity, and literacy skills in keiki. The program is regionalized to support haumāna (students) coming from these specific areas to build upon their knowledge of where they live and/or attend school. An increased knowledge base of where one is from naturally contributes to an increased sense of belonging. Sense of belonging to a place symbiotically results in a stewardship connection, all of which contributes to building our students' personal identities.





Ho'olauna

Definition: Ho'olauna means to introduce. In Issue 01, we introduced ourselves by sharing our names. In this Issue 02, we will extend our introduction by sharing where we are from, the 'āina we are connected to.

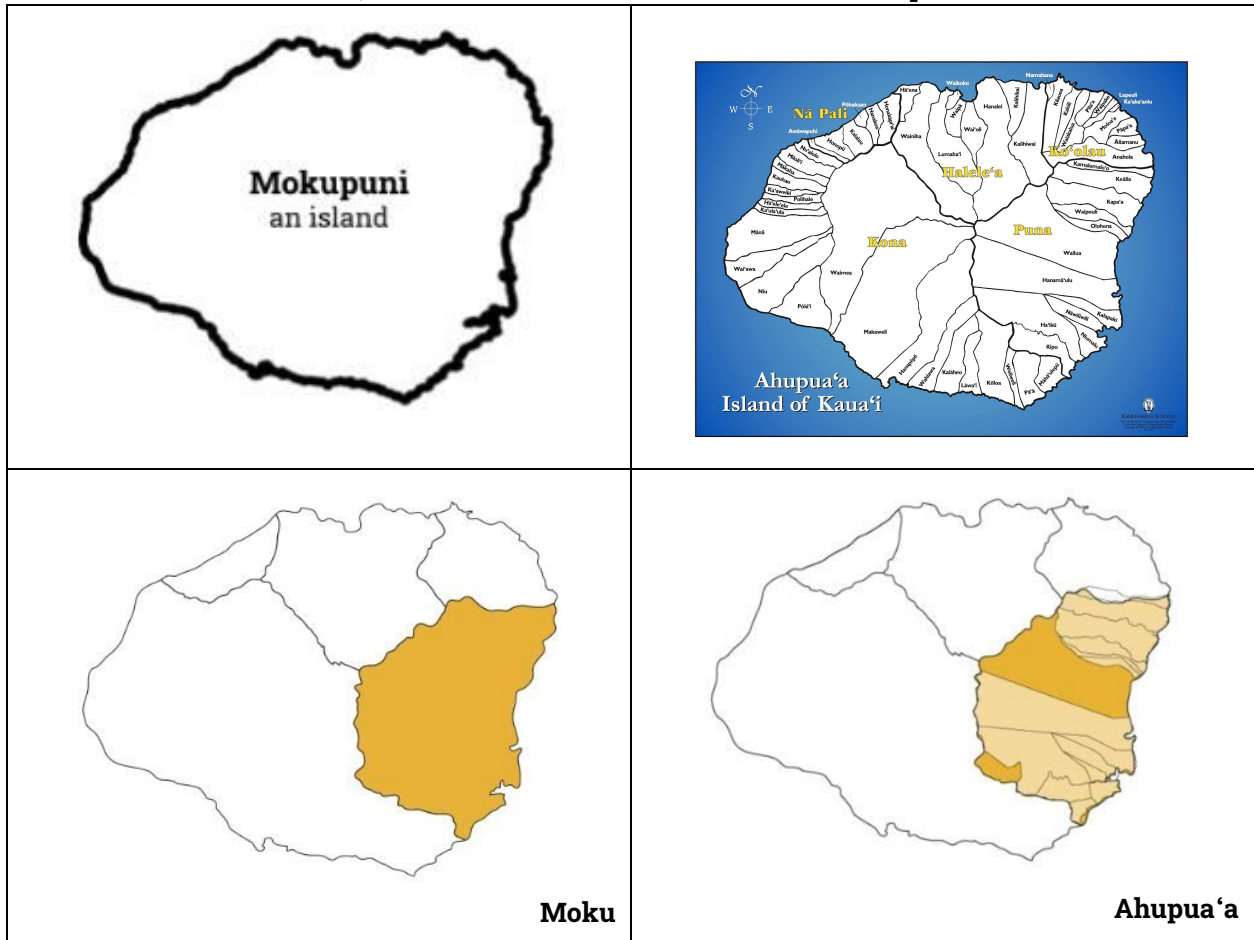

‘Āina: Moku

Definition: The term *moku* as we refer to it, means a division of an island, a boundary between the different divisions of an island, more specifically, a district. In this Issue, we will be learning more about the moku of Puna, the different ahupua‘a that make up this district, and mo‘olelo that make this moku so special.

‘Āina: Ahupua‘a

Definition: a land [division](#) usually extending from the uplands to the sea, so called because the boundary was marked by a heap ([ahu](#)) of stones surmounted by an image of a pig ([pua‘a](#)), or because a pig or other tribute was laid on the altar as *tas* to the chief.

The moku of Puna consists of ahupua‘a from Kīpū to Kamalomalo‘o (*just before Anahola*).

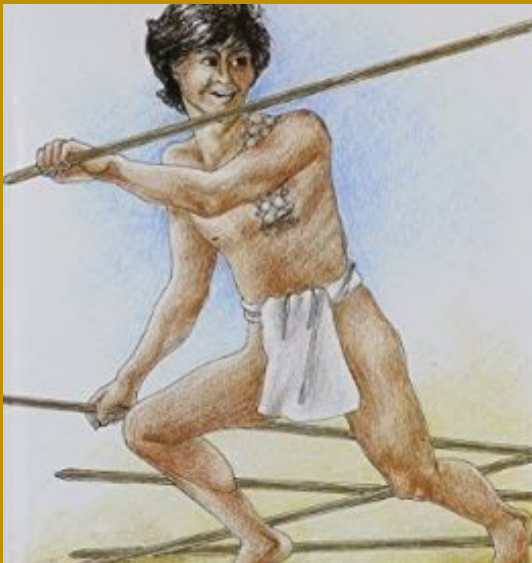
