BILL ALI'ILOA LINCOLN

HAWAI'I'S Valsetta POET

William "Bill" Lionel Kalaniali'iloa Lincoln was born on March 21, 1911 and raised on the gently sloping grasslands of Kehena, North Kohala, Hawai'i. The son of a paniolo and one of 15 children, Lincoln was an expert horseman by the time he was fourteen years old. His talent as a singer and entertainer was also obvious from a young age, and he was a noted performer at his alma mater, Kohala High School. Lincoln was fluent in both Hawaiian and English, which would serve him well throughout his distinguished career as a composer and musician extraordinaire. His musical journey was inspired by the preeminent falsetto singers and other renowned performing artists of his time.

After graduating from high school in 1931 and forming his own musical group, Lincoln was discovered by the great John Kameaaloha Almeida, known as the *Dean of Hawaiian Music*. Thus, Lincoln left his home on the island of Hawaii and moved to Honolulu, Oʻahu where he became one of Almeida's protégés, performing with the group *Johnny Almeida's Hawaiians* and appearing on various radio programs on the station KGU, including the transpacific radio broadcast series known as Hawaii Calls.

As Lincoln's career took off, his remarkable talent as a vocalist truly set him apart. Hawaiian music historian and radio personality Harry B. Soria Jr. expounds in his essay, "Bill Ali'iloa Lincoln – Hawai'i's Falsetto Poet":

Lincoln's strong and clear voice could climb from bass to baritone, then from tenor to falsetto, and then to an even higher falsetto that few male Hawaiian falsetto singers have ever mastered. In addition to his extraordinary vocal range he also possessed a rarely matched ability to hold and sustain notes, and to replenish in an imperceptible split-second the breath he needed to soar even higher.

Lincoln was a skilled haku mele with many beloved compositions to his credit, and he often created his songs with the hula dancer in mind. His command of the nuances of Hawaiian poetry and his authentic understanding of culture and moʻolelo resulted in classic mele written for cherished places, people, experiences, and especially his home on Hawaiii island.


He also wrote with the subtle kaona of the affairs of the heart, and songs to honor specific people. "Nani Lāwaʻi" was written to honor Alexander McBryde, who had restored Mauna Kilohana, Queen Emma's home on Kauaʻi, after her death in 1886. "Mauna Lahilahi" honors Jack "Keaka" Waterhouse, another man who was respected and beloved by many. A third song, "Pualeialoha," honors Alice Pualeialoha Davis Fredlund, the co-owner of Bell Records.



In 1938, he formed his own group, *Bill Ali'iloa Lincoln & His Hawaiians*, and their popularity in the Waikīkī entertainment circuit took off.

Both visitors to Hawai'i and her residents alike, revered the brightest stars of the Hawaiian entertainment scene. As Hawai'i's music evolved through the later half of the 20th century, a young Hawaiian male voice would quickly earn his place in Hawaiian music history. Inspired by George Ka'inapau, "Hawai'i's Falsetto Extraordinaire," and Lena Machado, "Hawai'i's Songbird," this fresh voice would speak to a new generation of Hawai'i's music fans.

Lincoln's very first recording was in 1936 with his debut mele, "Kuʻu Lei Lilia," accompanied by *John Kameaaloha Almeida & His Hawaiians*. He would go on to be the very first recording artist for the prestigious Bell Records, which featured elite musicians and performers on the Hawaiian entertainment scene. In the late 1940s, Lincoln opened his own hula studio and later his own record shop.

Over the next several decades, Lincoln's success as a recording artist, performer, teacher, and show producer would continue not just in the Waikīkī entertainment scene, but would eventually take him across the United States, Canada, Mexico, Europe, and Africa.

In the 1970s, with tourism booming and Waikīkī changing almost beyond recognition, Lincoln's weekly schedule included performances at two new venues – the 'Ilikai Hotel on Ala Moana Boulevard and the Kāhala Hilton in Wai'alae – as well as the Halekūlani and the Royal. It is said that even after he officially retired as an entertainer he continued to write songs.

In the years following his passing on September 9, 1989, Lincoln received two posthumous accolades for his distinguished life's work: the Hawai'i Academy of Recording Arts Lifetime Achievement Award in 2005 and induction into the Hawaiian Music Hall of Fame in 2006.

Bill Ali'iloa Lincoln shared his talent as a composer, musician, hula dancer, teacher, and falsetto singer for six decades, inspiring and influencing several generations of younger vocalists and music lovers throughout Hawai'i and around the world. This evening's Song Contest will celebrate the legacy of this amazing star of Hawaiian entertainment, honoring some of his most cherished compositions and recalling the people, places, and stories they immortalize.

The Song Contest is unique to Kamehameha – a tradition that has involved all students in musical competition for one hundred four years. Miss Laura Brown, Director of Music at Kamehameha 1926-1947, stated that "the objectives of the song contest are to build up the repertoire of the best in Hawaiian music for the cultural heritage of any student who attends Kamehameha; to develop leadership, cooperation and good class spirit; and to give students the use of their singing voices and to give them pleasure in singing as a means of expression."

The first song contest for male students was held at the School for Boys in 1921. A cup named for George Alanson Andrus, a former director of music at Kamehameha School for Boys whose life inspired the idea of an annual song contest, was offered as an incentive in the competition.

1922 marked the first year that both the Kamehameha boys and girls held song contests. Mrs. E. G. Scoville, a visitor to the Islands from Watertown, Connecticut, was so impressed with the singing of the Kamehameha girls that she donated the New England Mothers' Cup for the School for Girls competition.

In 1967, an additional trophy was offered by the Trustees in honor of Charles Edward King, an 1891 graduate of the School for Boys. The trophy is awarded to the class winning the combined class competition.

The Louise Aoe McGregor Award, named for a member of the first graduating class of the School for Girls in 1897, was first presented in 1972. It recognizes the student director who has made the most significant contribution to the class in organizational ability, leadership, assistance to others, and persistence.

The Richard Lyman, Jr. 'Ōlelo Makuahine (Mother Language) Award recognizes excellence in the use of the Hawaiian language within a song. Mr. Lyman, a Kamehameha Schools trustee from 1959 to 1988, was keenly interested in the preservation of Hawaiian language and culture.

The Helen Desha Beamer Award recognizes the best musical performance. Donated by the Kamehameha Alumni Association, the award honors the substantial contributions of Helen Desha Beamer to the lexicon of Hawaiian music. Helen Desha Beamer was a 1900 graduate of the Kamehameha School for Girls.

In the early years, the girls' song contest was held in front of the Assembly Hall, and the boys had their contest in front of Bishop Hall. When the School for Girls campus on Kapālama Heights was completed in 1931, separate contests for boys and girls were held in the auditorium. In 1952, the first combined contest of the School for Girls and School for Boys Senior Division took place in Kekūhaupi'o, the newly constructed fieldhouse. The song contest moved to the Neal Blaisdell Center in 1964 and has been attended by capacity crowds there since then. A highlight of the evening is the Hō'ike, a show to entertain and inform the audience while the judges' score sheets are tallied. The Hō'ike is an exhibition of the beauty of Hawaiian mele and hula.

CHORAL MUSIC



Lorna Kapualiko Lim was born and raised in the North Kohala district on Hawai'i Island. She is a proud 1981 graduate of Kohala High School and a member of the renowned and award-winning musical group, The Lim Family of Kohala. As a musician and


kumu hula of Hālau Kawehileimamoikawēkiuʻokohala, she has performed throughout North America, Europe and Japan. Lorna learned basic music theory at home at a young age and was trained in piano by Mrs. Margret Yap, but credits her first musical teachings and experiences from her mom and dad – the late Mary Ann and Elmer Lim, Sr. She is also trained in both Jazz and Blues styles of music.



Les Ceballos was born and raised in Waimea, Kauaʻi. He is a classically trained tenor, music educator, choral arranger, choral director, musician and pianist. Mr. Ceballos is a retired teacher and director of choral music for Kamehameha Schools Kapālama – after nearly 30

years of service. After graduating from Waimea High School, he attended the Firestone Conservatory of Music in Akron, Ohio where in 1975 he received his Bachelor of Arts degree in Music – with an emphasis on voice. He distinguished himself nationally and internationally at the Luciano Pavarotti International Vocal Competition in Philadelphia and the Llangollen Eisteddfod Tenor Competition in Wales. Mr. Ceballos has graced Hawai'i stages for many years with his beautiful voice as a member of the Hawai'i Opera Theatre and its numerous opera productions.


